


PEDIGREE G (1).

This branch of the family continued to live at South Petherton until 1761, when the last of them, Edwin, a doctor of medicine, was buried in the Church. His will, proved 1761, is in the Archdescorry of Taunton.



William Sandes, baptised at St. Bees, 1597, was one of the "Forty-nine Officers," being named in the Inrolments of the Adjudications in favour of (A.D. 1649) Officers (formerly denominated "the 49.Lots"), being one of the Arrear of Commissioned Officers on the watting list for a Grant of Lands from the Crown in recognition of having served in the Wars of Ireland previous to 5th June, 1649, in the reign of Charles I. He also applied for lands by virtue of serving in Ireland during the Commonwealth period; and, having received large grants of land in Co. Kerry, consisting of a great portion of the confiscated estates of the House of O'Conor, whose seat was Carrigafoyle Castle, he settled there, and was ancestor of the Sandes of Carrigafoyle. He marr, Elizabeth Fernley, who d. 1658 (funeral entry). See Appendix Note 117.



In the commencement of the 17th century two brothers named Sandys were seated in the parish of St. Keverne, in Cornwall, William and Anthony.

They are said to have been descended from Edwin Sandys, Archbishop of York, Pedigree A (36) and if so, were presumably his grandsons, but this cannot be proved.
